Presidents Report - Simon Thresher

Introduction

Once again it has been my pleasure to have had your trust in leading PMHHA through another season. 2018 will be remembered as the season that PMHHA first operated 2 artificial playing surfaces – fitting given that it was also our 10th anniversary season since PMHHA was formed in 2008.

That being said, PMHHA have never had to plan to play over 2 fields in the past. All members of the committee along with the senior leaders from each club have tried to provide an inclusive format of hockey to attract more players and spectators to the grounds on a Saturday across both genders and all grades including Juniors. This was done whilst trying to support our better players with new and challenging pathways.

Season 18 saw the introduction of a variety of new playing concepts, policies and procedures after listening to feedback from all the clubs. Members are buying in to the umpiring programme and our policies continue to be strengthened to ensure and even playing-field for all. We welcomed a local member, Leigh McIntosh as our HNSW RCC. Leigh has excelled in this role and continues to concentrate his efforts on junior recruitment, coaching and being the local “face” of Hockey NSW.

PMHHA continued their efforts to promote regional hockey after the disappointing commitment in Season 2017 – the committee understands that our membership wants this to continue and there is continued debate as to the merits of Regional Hockey, the format that it should take and indeed how we allow access to better hockey for our better players. All this whilst keeping the general memberships wishes firmly in mind.

These efforts all come at considerable personal costs to those elected and volunteer managers of our association. My personal thanks are extended to my deputy Heath Thompson, and of course to Rod Winterton and Graeme Ferguson for their exemplary efforts throughout a challenging year – Graeme stepping up and managing both the Junior Competition and as the manager of all things related to our representative teams; and Rod doubling up as the Umpires Manager! Cathy Whitbourne has been our Treasurer for the last 5 years and this year she has given her resignation. Cathy, you are a GEM and thank you for all your efforts on the Executive team over the last 5 years. We hope to still see you around the grounds. Julie Witchard took on the role of coordinating the SMC this season as a non-executive member. It's a somewhat thankless job Julie and on behalf of the Committee and all members we say thanks.

Of course, collective thanks are given to all those coaches, managers, and other members that contributed throughout the season as well as all those club delegates that sit on committees to provide the senior management with guidance of the issues that are ‘on-the-ground’.

Membership

Member numbers were slightly down on the previous year with a total of 691 members at time of publication.

These figures highlight both our strength and weakness in membership numbers as well as opportunities for target recruiting into the future. As we stay with Revolutionise in the coming years, this system will provide quality data on our membership base and show trends over time. Similarly, PMHHA has enjoyed an excellent working relationship with the media during season 17. Articles regularly fill the papers, fixtures and results are broadcast across the Triple M network, I have had several interviews on ABC Radio sports, and Prime 7 local news continues to follow our successes.

Finances and Grounds

On the back of memberships, our finances remain relatively strong with approximately \$200,000 in the bank and for the first time in well over 10 years we have no outstanding loans. Budgeting measures were generally adhered to; however, one of the biggest expenses were for professional consultancy and application fees for a DA with the local council and for grant preparation to the State Government. PMHHA also contracted a permanent part-time facilities maintenance person this year as well as increase in lawn mowing and grounds maintenance due to the facilities increase in usable area this year.

It is expected that in collaboration with council, the bottom field will have a new \$200,000 plus lighting system installed early in the new year.

Competition

After much deliberation, PMHHA reverted back to a 3 Tier senior competition and kept the status quo in juniors.

There still remains a great divide in talent across seniors and juniors. Future management of PMHHA must take this into account in order to provide meaningful competition that not only retains members through; fun, enjoyment and challenge, but also a competition that enables recruitment of new 'non-hockey' members.

The 2018 competition structure was aimed at full inclusiveness at the start of the season allowing all members to play where required for their clubs. After heated debate from club representatives, clubs decided that this was not the way they wanted to play the sport and a somewhat traditional format was adopted very early in the playing season. PMHHA recognised some of the impacts this has had and as such has conducted a survey to ascertain a broader cross-section of opinions that the incoming 2019 committee can focus on. The results of the survey are discussed below!

Survey Results and 2019 Competition Focus

A survey was conducted at the conclusion of season 2018 to ascertain a broader cross section of the wants and desires of the PMHHA playing membership. A summary of those results is provided below and the full results can be found at Annex 1.

- There is **STRONG** support for a local A, B & C Grade competition including **MAJORITY** support for additional teams to play in / with MVHA
- The **MAJORITY** of us desire to play on weekends
- The **MAJORITY** of us think that our local hockey should be structured so that our better players have the ability to freely play in other competitions (Taree, Newcastle, Sydney etc)
- There is a **STRONG** belief that we should be able to play 2 or more games per week
- There is **STRONG** support that teams should be restricted to only being allowed to be comprised of 20 or fewer players from their club
- There is **OVERWHELMING** support that players should be graded and restricted to where they can play each week

MAJORITY = up to 60% support or the greater number of votes under 60%

STRONG = 60% - 75% support

OVERWHELMING = 75% - 100% support

The incoming committee is urged to take note of the wants of the members and to devise a competition based on these desires.

Closing

In closing, I would ask you all to consider a position of some sort within PMHHA. Volunteer burnout is a very real risk that faces many sporting and community groups. You do not have to put your hand up to be on an elected committee! There are a variety of tasks that you can be appointed to. Some of these are as small as being the chairperson of the Judiciary, canteen manager, representative teams gear steward, grounds / facilities coordinator, social media coordinator, to name but a few. Over 90% of all work is undertaken by 2 or 3 people with some having 4 or 5 portfolios to manage. Spreading this load around ensures that all aspects of our growing sport are shared around, input is from a variety of sources, and all actions and procedures become transparent across all clubs and both genders.

Thank you all for a great season and I look forward to seeing you all around the grounds in what is sure to be an exciting season 19 as we finally get to use our second field to full capacity under lights.

Financial Position - Cathy Whitbourne

As at the end of the hockey financial year, the association had approximately \$210,000.00 across both accounts with all loans now being fully paid out.

There was approximately \$4,000.00 of monies still owing to the association at the end of the hockey financial year. This money is owed from Rep Fees, Team Fees and ground signage and advertising. At the time of writing all but \$195 has been recovered.

Women's Regional League placed 3rd in the Manning Valley Women's A Division competition.

For the 2018 season, the Executive made the decision to change the format of the senior competition that would:

- incorporate both a PMHHA Men's and Women's Regional Team who would play as an association team in both genders of the Manning Valley Association's competition;
- Create a Men's and Women's Premier League competition where the 2017 A and B grade competitions would play as one combined division competition. The teams would then be divided into A and B Divisions at the end of the season according to annual end of season point score and play in either the A or B Division Final Series;
- Create a Men's and Women's Hastings League competition, based on the 2017 C Grade competitions format and still play on Wednesday and Friday nights.

The initial few weeks of the 2018 season saw some considerable challenges in relation to forecasted structure of the new competition model as well as the unfortunate withdrawal of a women's premier league team in Round 4. The SMC had to rethink the structure and playing rules around the new model and formulate some new strategies to help keep the competition viable so that Clubs and players could still be able to field viable teams.

A new policy, Gradings and Player Movements, was enacted so that each team had a 20-player limit for the season. This worked in the most part but it did place restrictions on some of our Premier League teams who had players also playing with our Women's Regional Team at the same time in the Manning Competition. This sometimes-caused teams to play short on many occasions so some consideration should be made in the 2019 season to try to overcome these issues.

There were a quite a few problems in the initial few weeks of the competition with some Clubs not being aware of the current PMHHA Policies. These breaches resulted in penalties to many teams within the first 4 rounds. I would encourage each Club to make sure all Club officials, coaches, managers and players are aware of their responsibilities, especially surrounding our junior players playing in the PMHHA senior competition. There are policies and procedures in place that have been enacted for quite a number of years now and it is the Clubs responsibility to ensure that their players, coaches and managers are aware of these policies so that breaches do not occur from the first round of competition. These team breaches throughout the year did affect the final standings of some teams at season end. I would encourage the incoming 2019 SMC committee to enforce penalties from Round 1 in 2019 as a "grace" period within the first few rounds caused many problems for the administration of the competition. Consistency in decision making is a must for the SMC so that the competition will be run fairly and consistently throughout the season.

As with every season, players come and go. Unfortunately, some Clubs found that they had actually lost players because of the new playing format, i.e. one premier league division instead of the A, B, and C grades divisions that had been in the previous 3 years. Hopefully, in 2019 those players may return and we hope to attract new players to the senior ranks.

We were fortunate to finally have two turf fields available early in the 2018 season, one only during daylight hours, to run our senior competition. This brought about its own challenges by now having to spread umpires and duty officials over two fields at the same time. It also meant that on most Saturdays, all senior games were finished by 5pm. Hopefully, in the 2019 season, we will have the use both field into the night and the competition will be able to revert back to 35-minute halves.

Although Revolutionise has made many of the players statistical reporting and payment much easier for Clubs and players, the system still does not help to record all of the statistics that we require to be able to manage our weekly competitions. There are parameters in place in Revolutionise that are set and cannot be manipulated for the differences that arise in each League; i.e. Team players numbers are restricted when recording, finals eligibility is set and cannot be altered for each grade. A manual system of recording player data would still be required.

Thank you to all of our players and supporters who officiated as umpires and technical officials. Without your efforts, our competitions would not be able to organised and run in an efficient manner.

I would like to thank all of our Senior Match Committee, Brad Deeganaars, Robyn Charlesworth, Simone Cook, Sarah Blundell, Zac Mason, Heidi Fitzpatrick, Neal Freeman and Leane Harwood (as well as other Club delegates who stepped in from time to time) for all of your support, encouragement and consistency in decision making. Your efforts generally go unnoticed but are very much appreciated by the remainder of the Senior Match Committee and the PMHHA Executive.

Moving forward into 2019, we all need to work together to keep our competition enjoyable and competitive. We have learnt some lessons in 2018 and hopefully we can move forward into 2019 and take on board some recommendations from the player survey that was distributed last month. I encourage more players to step up and help your clubs and the association to help run our competition. There are always many complaints made but those who complain usually do not put their hand up to help.

The SMC would encourage the continued ongoing training of umpires and officials. It is imperative that all clubs understand the roles and responsibilities of umpires and technical officials and the need to train more willing umpires and officials so that the handful of umpires who umpire every week could occasionally enjoy some off-field time instead of backing up to umpire or officiate either before or after they play.

Again, thank you to all of our Senior Match Committee Delegates for the continued support of hockey in the Port Macquarie Hastings area and to the PMHHA Executive for continuing to develop our hockey facility so that it may become a hockey centre that we can all be proud of.

Rep Teams and Honours

PMHHA was well represented across all age groups, both genders and both formats of the games during season 18. Our continued push in the junior ranks is paying dividends with rep teams either confirming their place in Division 2 or finishing in the top few teams in Division 3. Of course, the 13's boys win in Division 2 sees them promoted to Division 1 for the 2018/19 Indoor season. This bodes well for future players and provides a competitive pathway for all our local players to aspire too in both junior and senior ranks. In the coming season there should be a push to get Open Age teams away to State Championships in order to continue the pathways for all our players locally.

It is great to finally see some good policy around the selection and management of our junior rep teams. This makes it easier for anyone to assist with our rep teams as the position of the association is now stated clearly for all to see.

Umpires Managers Report – Rod Winterton

PMHHA continued with the umpiring model to upskill and improve our officials. Buy-in from the clubs is becoming evident and all clubs Umpire Managers / Coaches should be commended. All members, even those that don't umpire, are encouraged to attend the rules sessions that are held throughout the season. These are informative and contain up to date and relevant information.

A few statistics from season 18;

- \$11,500 paid to all our officials - \$500 under budget
- 32 umpires were eligible for and claimed payment
- 600 games in season 2018 from u/13 to Regional League
- 70% of all games were umpired by 14 people
- 5% of PMHHA members umpire
- Competent pool increased by 12% this season

Firstly, a big thank you to the all PMHHA Exec. who have put in a huge number of hours 'behind the scenes' to make the running of the competition successful. Camden Haven Hockey Club found the 2018 season, in general a great year. Like any season there was some hiccups that were sorted out along the way.

CHHC fielded 11 teams in this year's competition, 5 senior teams and 6 junior teams, with our Under 16's Taipans and B Grade Men's Black Snakes taking the Premiership honours in their respective divisions. Port City Hockey Club welcomed their first female president and were the first club to implement a constitution. We had the support of our sponsors, Port City Bowling, Ken Little Fruit & Veg & Port Fresh Seafoods.

I did not have a clear understanding of the new structure for this year and felt our club could have put in an additional team. 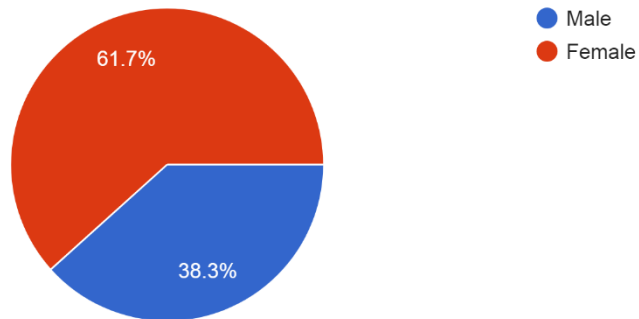

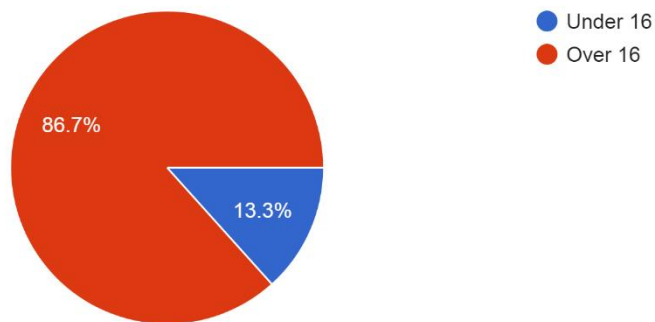

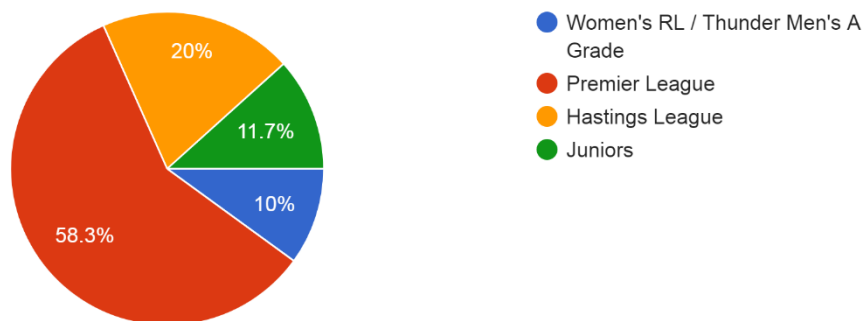
1. What is your gender?



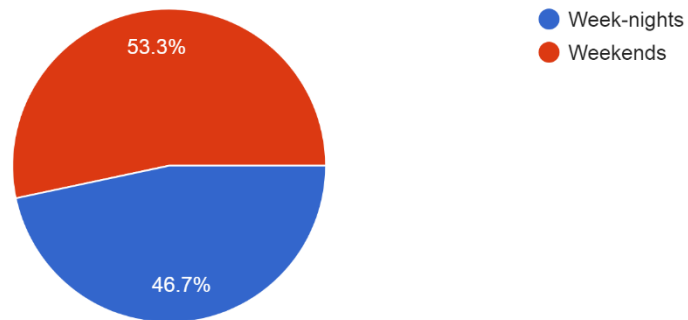
2. What is your age group?



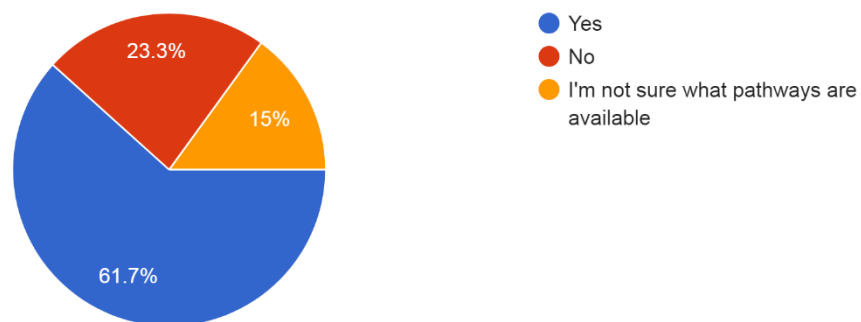
3. In what grade did you (or your child / dependant) play MOST of your hockey in 2018?



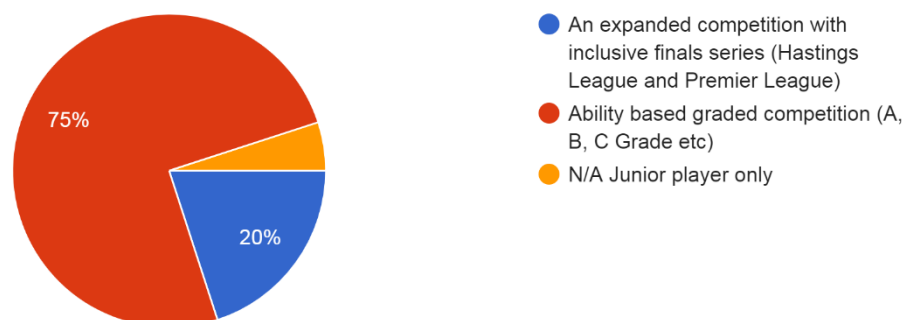
4. What is your preferred playing day?



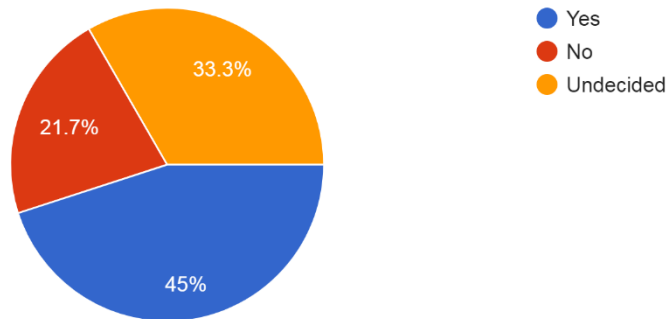
5. Do you believe there are enough athlete pathways and options to play hockey LOCALLY in Port Macquarie?



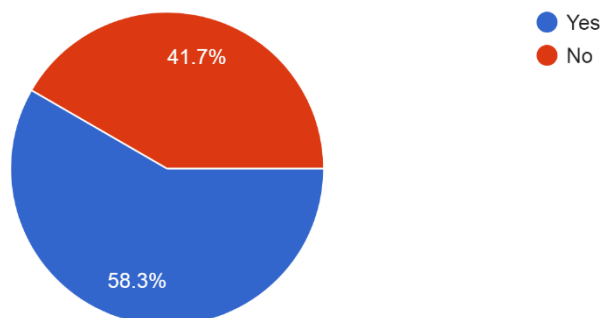
6. What is your preferred LOCAL senior competition structure?



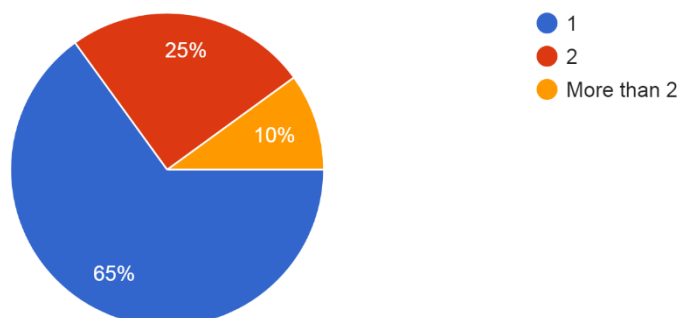

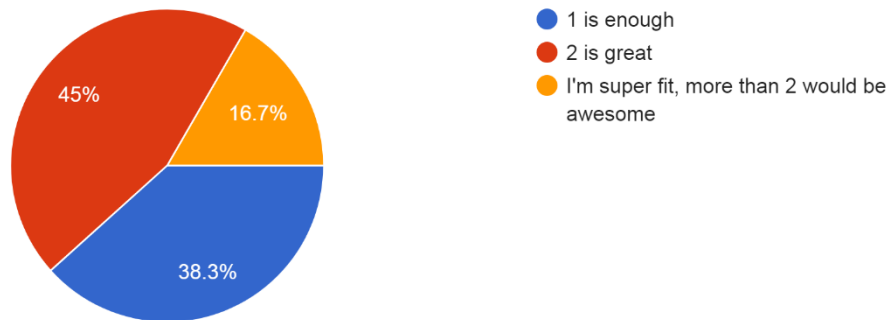

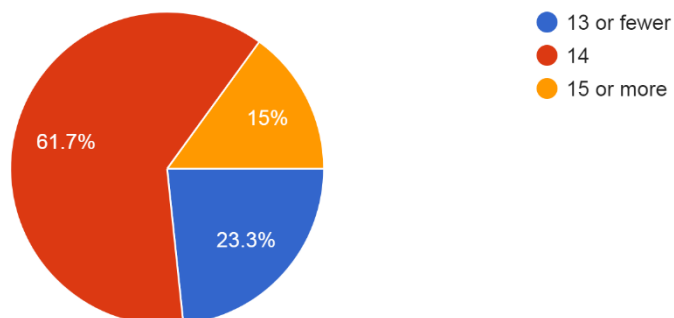
